Dear Parents

In the gospel reading this Sunday we begin the accounts of Jesus appearing to his Apostles post his resurrection. There are two themes that stand out in this week's writings by St John. Forgiveness and Faith resonate as we read St John's Gospel for the Second Sunday of Easter. The Gospel is about forgiveness and about recognising the presence of the risen Jesus in our midst. Jesus offers those gathered peace, as he offers us peace here today. Jesus speaks of forgiveness. for we are not innocent, and unless those we have hurt forgive us we find it hard to be at peace. We can keep people in a bind by refusing to forgive them. Jesus tells us that when we forgive, God forgives.

The Gospel goes on to speak of Thomas often referred to as "Doubting Thomas". Thomas is a "symbol of hope" for us all who, like Thomas, were not there to experience Jesus on the first Easter day. Like Thomas we recognise that we cannot forever rely on the faith of others. We are grateful to our parents, teachers and to the inspiration given us by members of our local parish community and by Christians world-wide for sharing their faith and the Good news with us all since we were able to speak. The Holy Spirit is the gift given to us all by God that drives our faith and the relationship we have with our Heavenly Father.

Last week as a school community each day we shared in the Holy Week story culminating in us rejoicing in the risen Lord on Tuesday morning. Each day our children lead us through scripture, prayer and song as we journeyed with Jesus as he rode triumphantly into Jerusalem, endured his betrayal, crucifixion and death and finally witnessing his glorious resurrection. Thank you to the staff and and children for preparing our celebration each day and sharing the Easter story with us. A special thanks to our REC Mrs Burley for her preparation and drive in working with the teachers and students to bring our Easter story alive. Thank you also to our parents and parishioners who joined us each day to join in the celebrations. Finally, on Tuesday our Easter week concluded with our Easter hat parade with many creative hats being worn celebrating the spirit of Easter. I'm sure there were many hours spent using glue guns, scissors and thread- thanks Mum and Dad!

Next term on Wednesday 9th May [Week 2] we will be holding our first KLA [Key Learning Area] parent workshop. On the night our Lead teachers will explore with our parent community our Literacy Numeracy and Formation goals for 2018. We also will explore some strategies parents can employ at home to assist with their children's with reading. Please mark this workshop in your term 2 diaries.

Next Thursday and Friday I will be accompanying year six students and their teachers on the Canberra field trip. Throughout this term the children have been studying democracy, the election process and the various levels of government within our Australia communities. We will keep you abreast of our travels over the two days via Skoolbag.

What's happening in Kindergarten?




We love learning to read during our Guided Reading time. We are already starting to write a little bit and we love to draw.

ANZAC Day Launch Kit

On Wednesday, the 4th of April, the year 6 student leaders visited the Parramatta RSL Club, with several other leaders from other schools in our diocese.

At the ANZAC day launch they showed and provided us with an online educational ANZAC kit that helps teach us about the importance of ANZAC day. In the kit it contains a brief introduction on ANZAC day to teach children how important ANZAC day is. This included a crossword, find a word, recipes and colouring in, which would be very resourceful in our learning towards ANZAC day.

We listened to a representative from the Invictus Games, Gwen. Her husband fought in the war as a commando. After the war he struggled with his mental health and unfortunately committed suicide in 2016. Because of this tragedy Gwen decided to travel to an unsafe area of Afghanistan and help, build and repair, destroyed homes. Her contribution to this in Afghanistan was very brave and played a major role that was very significant. When others asked her why she was doing this she always replied because no one else was brave enough to do. She realised the importance of the soldiers that served and kept us free, this was Gwen's motivation.

There were also three leaders from other schools that gave speeches about their families that have served our country in the army and ANZAC day. One girl in particular had a story about her dad and how he goes off and they have to worry about him. Their speeches made everyone realise what the soldiers and their families have to go through everyday of their lives. War veterans also came to tell us about how ANZAC day needs to be remembered in the future.

The Invictus Game Foundation is run by Prince Harry. The invictus games are for war veterans who may be paraplegics, may have lost part of their movement or had any other serious injuries. This helps them remember what they used to do and that they can still do it. Their slogan is: 'I am' and it comes from the last two words of an poem "Invictus" by english poet William Ernest Henley. 'I am' reflects the games purpose to provide a "platform" for personal achievement for war veterans who believe they can do it.

Lest we forget those who served our country, without them Australia would not be up to its standards, and none of us would be able to go outside and feel safe. This is what we really need to appreciate about our brilliant servers who fought. This is exactly what all of us were thinking about on that day.

Bullying also has a major impact on how comfortable people feel. In fact 7 out of 12 people are bullied in Australia and 2 out of 4 people that are bullied feel uncomfortable because of it. That's a huge number of people that feel uncomfortable, everyday, just because of bullying. Imagine how many people are just uncomfortable in general if that's just from bullying.

We need to make sure we are looking after ourselves and looking after each other. We need to be comfortable in our own skin and in our environment. Comfort matters, and we need to make it a priority.


Earlier this term, every student at Christ The King participated in a competition to design a mascot for our school.

The students were asked to design a mascot that could represent our school, our values and our environment. They also had to explain why they had chosen their design.


There were plenty of excellent entries and very creative designs.




Crystal King Crystal King is wearing a school uniform. Crystal King is a play on words and represents the beauty of the school.







HAVING ISSUES WITH THE Skoolbag app



If you find you are not receiving messages or have lost your alert ping, sometimes it is just a matter of removing and re-installing the app.

System updates sometimes cause these minor issues.

USE YOUR Skoolbag app TO NOTIFY YOUR CHILD'S ABSENCE FROM SCHOOL



- 1. Open Skoolbag app
- 2. Click on eForms
- 3. Select Absentee Form
- 4. Complete all fields
- 5. In the last field you need to tap and then you can sign with your finger on your phone screen
- 6. Press Submit

This will send an instant email to the school to advise your child's absence.

This document is now legally acceptable as an Absentee Notification as the form is signed. You will <u>not</u> need to send in an additional note when your child returns to school.

This eForm on the Skoolbag App is not to be used for extended Family leave.

- Request for Family leave (1-5 days) must be emailed to the Principal. If travelling overseas, an itinerary must accompany this application.
- For Family leave over 5 days, an Application for Extended Leave must be submitted at least 2 weeks prior to departure. *If travelling overseas, an itinerary must accompany this application.*

STUDENT LEAVE APPLICATIONS (any leave other than student sick leave) COMPULSORY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

The Catholic Education Office Diocese of Parramatta (CEDP) has procedures and guidelines in place to achieve high standards of student attendance in collaboration with parents. Parents are required by law to ensure that children aged between 6 and 17 attend school.

Schools are required to monitor and keep a register of student attendance and explained absences.

Requirements for Exemption from attendance for student absence and travel

1-5 days absence: Parents must notify the school principal by mail or email (written) at least 2 weeks before leave date. If this travel is Overseas, an Application for Extended Leave form must be completed. Copies of travel documents must attach Overseas applications.

5-100 days absence (whether travelling in Australia or Overseas): Parents must complete and submit the Application for Extended Leave form at least 2 weeks prior to commencing leave (Copies of travel documents must accompany this application whether travelling in Australia or Overseas). If approved the Principal issues a Certificate of Extended Leave. If the principal declines this application (i.e: it is not within the best interest of the child to take leave and be absent from school), a letter notifying parents that the application has been declined would be forthcoming.

Please note: Until both the 'Volunteer Form' and the 'Module' have been completed, parents will not be able to assist in any capacity as a volunteer within the school. (The school receives notification when you complete each section).

'Building Child Safe Communities' is a new initiative developed by Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta that enhances our commitment to ensuring the safety and wellbeing of all students in our care. It is now a requirement that <u>all</u> volunteers and contractors complete an online undertaking form that confirms expectations in relation to behaviour whilst volunteering or contracting at schools, Catholic Out of Schools Hours Care and Catholic Early Learning Centres. This undertaking form also seeks to determine the suitability of volunteers and contractors by requiring them to declare that they do not have a criminal history involving children.

- If any of the details you have provided on the form change


